Silicon Valley Leadership Group Foundation Teams Up with Hack Foster Care Coalition to Improve the Lives of Foster Youth

Local Tech Companies to Support Regional Initiative to Transform Foster Care System

SAN JOSE – November 2, 2016 — Silicon Valley Leadership Group Foundation today announced a strategic partnership with the Hack Foster Care coalition of Silicon Valley to transform the lives of 1,440 foster youth in Santa Clara County.

In America today, barely half of the nation's 400,000 foster youth will graduate high school, only 3 percent will earn a college degree, 25 percent will be homeless by the age of 20 and 25 percent will be incarcerated by 25.

The partnership is intended to bring together local technology companies and foster care advocates to transform the existing processes and technology infrastructure in the child welfare system by integrating artificial intelligence, cloud-based solutions and other advanced technology. The goal is to dramatically improve the lives of children and families in Santa Clara County and ultimately across the country.

"The Silicon Valley Leadership Group Foundation is very pleased to partner with the Hack Foster Care coalition and share the talent and resources of its member organizations," said Carl Guardino, Executive Director of Silicon Valley Leadership Group Foundation. "Improving the foster care system is an addressable problem that can be solved by engaging the Valley's leading technology companies. Working together, we can remove the barriers to the educational and career success that have held back foster youth for too long."

The Hack Foster Care coalition is a network of technology companies, non-profits, foundations, foster youth alumni and governmental agencies working together to engage the technology sector to improve outcomes for children and families in the child welfare system. Formed in May 2016 at the first ever Foster Care Hackathon at the White House, the coalition has three strategic objectives: Improve access to technology by providing laptops and Internet access to foster youth, reform the foster youth technology infrastructure, and prepare foster youth for college and careers. The coalition is planning a follow-up Hackathon in Silicon Valley on February 27-28, 2017.

"This partnership is an important milestone that can potentially transform the foster care system here and across the country," said John Hogan, CEO of <u>TeenForce</u>, a Leadership Group member and a provider of work readiness services to foster youth. "The current system is clearly failing foster youth, and as a society, we have an obligation to them. Exemplary companies such as Symantec, SanDisk, Box, Microsoft, Google, Salesforce and Adobe are stepping up to help us make a difference. We invite other companies to join us and work with the Silicon Valley Leadership Group Foundation."

Yali Lincroft, program director for the Walter S. Johnson Foundation, said: "The possibilities are endless when we think of applying the spirit and brilliance of the tech industry to address the challenges in the child welfare system. Imagine if we can use state of the art analytics and database technology to recruit thousands of new foster families or to match foster youth with families most likely to lead to their success. We also look forward to working with the tech sector to help meet our foundation's joint commitment with Foster Care Counts to ensure that 100 percent of teenage foster youth have access to laptops and the internet. Currently, just 20 percent of foster teens in California have regular access to a laptop, which contributes to poor education outcomes. We plan to deliver 10,000 laptops to foster teens in California over the next three years to help these youth compete on a level playing field."
